introduction

This year is a very special year for our educational programme here at the Englefield Estate. We are very proud that The Countryside Days for Schools is now in its 21st year and that from its humble beginning it has grown to the event you see today.

Over the years the principle of the days has not changed in that the Estate's aim has been to educate the young in the country environment. The link between the countryside and the food they eat is our primary focus and threads throughout our programmes of learning.

From the very beginning the event has sought to establish an understanding for children to see the importance of local and national sites of food production and over the past 21 years it has moved to include many other historical and environmental elements the Estate has to offer.

Over the years there have been many developments such as the reorientation of stands enabling new opportunities for wider classroom studies into sustainability, conservation, declining habitats and our responsibility to our world.

In 2011 the new Flexible Route was introduced allowing us to significantly increase child numbers whilst giving space for new stands including the Environment Agency, Moths and Butterflies, Thames Water, Ferrets and the Blacksmith's Shop, not to mention the immense feat of gathering all the tools and devices used on the Estate for domestic and farming purposes in the past, restored and displayed in the Museum in the Estate Yard.

Central to the organisation and success of the days is the magnificent Tudor mansion. Since 1997 the tours around Englefield House have gathered momentum increasing numbers to a formidable 600 children each day.

The numerous treasures in the museum and the opening of the Blacksmith's shop, restored and maintained in period condition, fires the imagination of young and old and transports us back to the past.

Keeping up with a diverse and changing curriculum has been a huge commitment. Such links with national educational programmes and strategies help us to build a love of learning out of the classroom for children, whilst playing a significant role in meeting wider curriculum aims.

The essence of the Schools Days is best expressed by Sir William Benyon in the very first Handbook.

...we are taking a long term view in the management of this Estate and consider our role here as only temporary and maintaining what you see here today for

future generations.' (Sir William Benyon 1997)

event how it works



All schools should arrive in the Deer Park by 9.30pm. This deadline is important to keep as it links into our timed routes. Groups will be divided into the numbers given in their confirmation letter. Should schools arrive late and they are following a timetabled route, they will be expected to start their day at the stand nearest their time of arrival and not at the beginning.



From the publications sent to you prior to your visit you will have been designated either a timed route or our Flexi route. If your selection is a timed route you will follow, in order, the route and visit the stands specifically on your timetable. If you have been selected our Flexi route you can plan the stands you want to visit from the many Flexi Route stands listed in the Handbook.



All stands will allow each group 25 minutes at their stands. For schools following an issued timetable – you should arrive at each stand by the time on your timetable. Schools planning their own day on our flexible route – you should be aware of this time allowance.







Schools following an issued timetable will have a chance to visit Englefield House. Your time to visit appears in the Teacher Led part of the timetable and is identified as History 1 CY – the red letters signifying the entrance point which could either be CY – court yard entrance or LG – Long Gallery entrance.



Our official break for the whole event is for lunch which starts at 12.10pm and ends at 12.40pm. We would ask that schools try to keep to this recess as staff and guides will also be taking a break at that time. In the event of wet weather you will note on our site plan within the handbook and our insert plan, rain symbols, which represent designated shelter for lunch. We have also given Time Out spaces on the timed routes in order to allow for essential breaks and rests.



The days end at 3.05pm. All stands will continue to welcome groups until the site is clear. Should you wish to leave earlier than this, it is essential that you give prior notice so that we can prepare staff and for the safeguarding of the children.

Transport should arrive on time and wait in the Deer Park as on arrival. Toilets are often crowded at this time so please plan ahead.

Keeping them safe

Englefield Estate takes the protection of children very seriously. We consider that we have a duty to plan the days so that risks of harm to a child are recognised and acted upon. Significantly, we have identified a planned response to reduce the risks to children.











It is important that all involved in the Schools Days are rigorously kept informed of event's policies and procedures. Our publications on Health and Safety, Lost Child, Safeguarding Children Good Practice (SAFEcic) are distributed to all who support the days.

Certification

Key staff are certificated by Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) both at enhanced and basic level.

Regular training is undertaken to maintain an efficient understanding of national safeguarding in action.

Event-focussed practices

- Contact details of schools and teachers are at hand at all times during the event.
- Radio contact is provided to keystaff for immediate help and instruction.
- Vehicle movement is restricted to entry and exit times of day, other than site vehicles.
- •All stands and areas have been risk assessed and hazards reduced. Our Health and Safety publications are available online under Education.
- •Signs free standing information boards around the grounds (I) for information display, emergency contact details and procedures.



It is advised that all children and adults wash their hands thoroughly after coming in direct contact with animals. Each stand will have a gel sanitiser and positioned around the site in close proximity to animal stands will be hand washing facilities.

important notes

FIRST AID

We have 3 fully trained first aid people on the Estate. They are located in Englefield House, The Estate Yard and The Estate Office so all areas are covered in the event medical attention is needed. Our First Aid procedure is set out in the literature issued to all staff prior to the days. Teachers are also issued with this procedure which comes as part of the Teacher Pack.



ROUTES

Route 1 is split between morning and afternoon. There is a timed half and a Teacher Led half. You will need to see your own school timetable, which was included in your Teacher Pack, to find out which you are doing first, unless you have been allocated the Flexible Route in which case you will choose the stands you wish to visit from the Flexible Stands only (see pages 10 & 11).

Route 2 is as Route 1 but you will be visiting different timed stands.

The Flexible Route is a route that can be tailored to meet the needs of the teacher or class. You will find a list of all the stands you can choose from in this book (see pages 10 & 11).

HOUSE TOUR

If you have been selected to follow Route 1 or 2 you will find your time to visit Englefield House in the Teacher Led part of the day.

Please note The House tour starts, either at the front Courtyard (CY) or at the Long Gallery (LG) – please see your timetable to find out which entrance your school should use. You will be expected to find your own way to the House although the Tractor Trailer is at your service at all times.

TRACTOR TRAILER RIDE

The Tractor Trailer will be running regularly from The House to The Yard. However, you can be picked up as you walk at specific pick up points along the way (see map **Constant**). So if you have had enough of walking and you can see space on the Trailer - just hitch a ride.

SIGNS

All topic areas are given a designated colour and each stand within that topic area is colour coded with the topic area colour. E.g. the topic area of Farming is green, therefore, stands that incorporate Farming, such as Meat and Milk Production (Farming 1) or Sheep Shearing (Farming 3), will be identified around the grounds and in the paperwork by the colour green. The idea is to make it easier to find your way around the route systems.
